We have been delighted by the high number of *Inspiring the Future* volunteers wanting to support state schools and now have volunteers in every local authority in England, with all sectors represented. We can therefore announce the switch on of volunteer and school/college matching in all the **London boroughs, Manchester/Salford, Birmingham and Surrey.** This represents Phase One of the rollout across the entire country, prior to full switching on 2 July. From today state secondary schools and colleges can find volunteers in these areas.

Our employee volunteers have offered to do 'Career Insight' talks responding to invitations from teaching staff to talk to young people about the jobs they do and the education routes they took. In addition, we are asking volunteers to flag if they have particular experience of apprenticeships, running their own enterprise (whether a business or social enterprise) or using modern foreign languages at work. This is to meet demand from schools for employee volunteers who can talk knowledgeably about these areas.

New research identifies a clear link between work-experience at school and job prospects in later life. The quality of teenagers' work experience is strongly linked to future careers, however, it must rely on more than just their parents' connections, a report by the Education and Employers Taskforce says.

It's who you meet, that stops you being NEET


The Education and Employers Taskforce's groundbreaking 'It's who you meet that stops you being NEET' research report has already had 2,300 downloads. The new research, published in 2012, showed a significant link between young people's experience of the world of work while at school and the chances of them successfully avoiding becoming NEET (not in education, employment or training) as young adults. Those who recalled four or more employer contacts while in education are five times less likely to be NEET than those who had no involvement.

Speakers for Schools update

The *Speakers for Schools* team has been busy matching schools with speakers since its launch in October and there are now approximately 400 talks in diaries. There have been 90 talks, with another 170 organised for the coming months and a further 180 in the planning stage. Speakers this year so far have included household names such as; Lord Adebowale (Turning Point), George Alagiah (BBC

News), Dame Helen Alexander (CBI), Bill Gates (Microsoft), Mishal Husain (BBC News), David Morrissey (actor), Adele Parks (author), Dan Snow (historian and presenter) and from the world of government and politics: Dr Vince Cable, David Miliband and Baroness Warsi.

Eminent speakers pledged to give a free talk in a state school now total around 800, with applications from state secondary schools and colleges across England are up to 1,290. With some speakers have volunteered to do several talks per year, *Speakers for Schools* has been investing in new technology to increase the pace of matching.

Feedback from schools and colleges has been very positive. For example, earlier this week, Mr Chris Seward, Headteacher of Davenant Foundation School in Loughton, commented on their talk from Lord (Victor) Adebowale that focused on the parliamentary system and importance of social initiatives. He says: "The whole talk was incredibly interesting - Sixth Form students in particular responded well. Victor Adebowale had a fantastic rapport with the students and engaged two groups over two hours effortlessly! The word most frequently heard from students was 'inspiring'."

Speakers giving talks in just the last month have come from organisations as diverse as; the BBC, Citi Group, Carphone Warehouse, Financial Times, Ministry of Justice, HSBC, Stagereel Films, Logica, The Philosopher's Magazine, University of Cambridge and Rothschild.
