The importance of starting careers-related learning early

Over the last six years our charity Education and Employers in partnership with the National Association of Head Teachers have undertaken a series of studies into the impact volunteers from the world of work can have on primary aged children. Some 90% of primary teachers believe that introducing children to the world of work at an early age is important. By linking learning to the real world it helps increase motivation to work hard, brings more relevance to learning and challenges stereotyping children often have about jobs and the people who do them. They believe that volunteers can help broaden horizons and raise aspirations opening doors and showing children



the vast range of possibilities open to them and helping to keep their options open for as long as possible.

DRAWING THE FUTURE

In January 2018 in partnership with the National Association of Head Teachers, the TES, UCL Institute of Education and OECD Education and Skills we published the 'Drawing the Future' report. It was based on the findings of a survey which asked primary school children aged seven to eleven to draw a picture of the job they wanted to do when they grew. It explored who children ideally want to become, and what shapes (and often limits) their career aspirations and dreams for the future. It was done in response to the interest in the two minute film Redraw the Balance which the Charity published to mark International Women's Day 2016. Made pro-bono for us by Mullen Lowe the film which has been viewed over 75 million times, shows 66 children being asked to draw a picture of a surgeon, firefighter and a pilot. 61 of the children drew a picture of a man with only five drawing a woman.

Over 20,000 children took part in the survey from the UK and internationally including Australia, Belarus, Bangladesh, China, Columbia, Indonesia, Pakistan, Romania, Russia, Switzerland, Uganda and Zambia.

The survey found that gender stereotyping about jobs is set from a young age and that it is a global issue. And it was clear that from a young age many children had ideas about careers. 36% of children base their career aspirations on people they know. For

This has huge implications for social mobility, as children from poorer backgrounds may not have access to successful role models from the world of work and their aspirations are limited as a result.

I believe that all children regardless of their background should get the chance to meet a wide range of people doing different jobs, in different sectors and at different levels – from apprentices to CEOs.

This is essential if we are to improve social mobility and gender and ethnic equality. It is vital we support children

to challenge the perceptions they may have about certain jobs and to better understand the evolving world they are growing up in while they are still in primary school.

PRIMARY FUTURES

That is why in partnership with the NAHT we developed Primary Futures which connects primary schools with volunteers from the world of work. Nearly 4,000 primary schools have registered and some 47,000 people have volunteered.

Over the next 12 months our aim is to increase the number of primary schools engaged to 9,000 – 50% of all primary schools and to recruit another 20.000 volunteers with the ultimate goal of engaging all our primary schools and giving them access to 100,000 volunteers. Working together with you and our partners I believe we can achieve this.



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About Education and Employers

Education and Employers is a charity launched in 2009 with the vision of "providing children and young people with the inspiration, motivation, knowledge, skills and opportunities they need to help them achieve their potential". It aims to achieve this by working with schools, employers, the national bodies that represent them and a wide range of other partners including the government and third sector organisations.

The charity runs Inspiring the Future, a free service which uses innovative match-making technology to connect volunteers with state schools and colleges, quickly, simply and at scale. Schools can very easily search a massive database of willing volunteers, filter against a wide range of criteria – e.g. subject, sector, career route and send them a message. It enables young people, wherever they live, whichever school



they attend, the opportunity to meet people from a wide range of backgrounds doing jobs from across the whole world of work. It has revolutionised the way young people interact with the working world meaning that it is no longer limited to the jobs their parents do, who their parents know or the alumni that went to their school.

INVALUABLE INFLUENCE

Over 47,000 people have already registered to volunteer in the UK people from all levels: apprentices to CEOs and all sectors: apps designers to zoologists and over 80% of English secondary schools have also registered. People can volunteer from an hour a year in a local primary or secondary school to chat informally about their job and career route, take part in career speed networking session, give careers insights, provide mock interviews or feedback on CVs through to serving as a governor or trustee. There is also the opportunity to link up with schools for workplace visits, job shadowing and mentoring.

In partnership with the National Association of Head Teachers the charity has developed a version for primary schools called Primary Futures and nearly 4,000 primaries have already signed up. And in partnership with the National Governance Association the charity runs Inspiring Governance the free governor recruitment and support service.

Since the charity's launch, Education and Employers has sought to engagement in education makes to young people and the economy. It works with academics and researchers from around the world and its own research is regularly cited by government and international organisations like the OECD. The research, which has informed and influenced a range of government policies, shows that employer engagement helps improve social mobility, reduces the likelihood of young people becoming NEET (not in education, employment of training), increases the amount they earn in adult life and helps them make better informed career choices.
